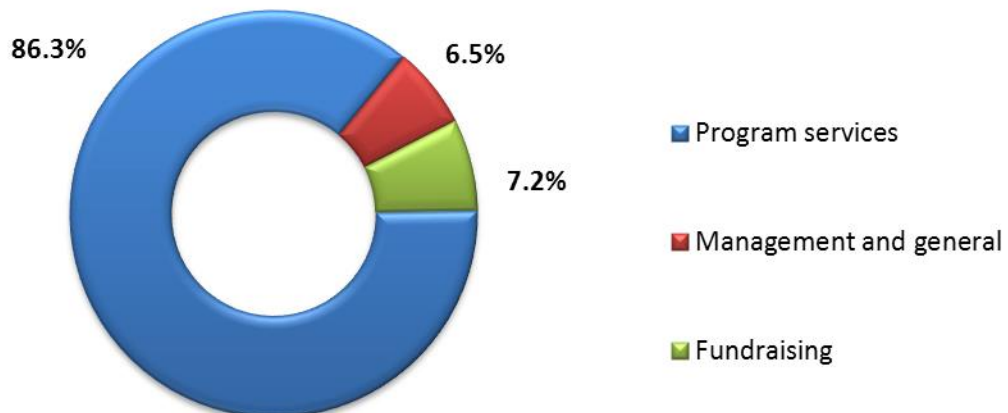

Program Work

HSI is campaigning to end cruel confinement of animals and related abuses in factory farming in Brazil, Canada, India, Mexico, and elsewhere, to end the commercial killing of seals for their fur in Canada and Namibia, to stop animal suffering caused by modern “Mercy Release” ceremonies that encourage the capture and subsequent release of wild animals in Asia and worldwide, to encourage responsible wildlife viewing as an alternative to consumptive uses, to end shark finning and the consumption of shark fin soup, to promote better approaches to testing and research that do not harm animals, to improve the welfare of captive wildlife (especially marine mammals) and to protect whales, polar bears and other wildlife from consumptive uses and habitat degradation. HSI also conducts other more local campaigns in specific regions of the world.

HSI carries out substantial work on wildlife trade (via CITES and other activities); commercial and so-called scientific whaling, via the International Whaling Commission (IWC); alternatives to animal testing via the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD) and other global harmonization bodies; and animal protection mechanisms within international trade negotiations and trade agreements. In addition, HSI engages the European Union, the Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO), and the World Organization for Animal Health (OIE) on farm animal welfare, and cooperates with international animal NGOs to press for husbandry improvements to reduce animal suffering across the globe.

HSI supports capacity-building for animal protection organizations worldwide through a variety of educational and hands-on programs, including a specialized international track at the annual Animal Care Expo and customized workshops in target nations and regions. HSI's programs for street dogs support the spread of knowledge, skills, and technologies necessary to accomplish high volume sterilization of street dog populations. Our initiatives train veterinarians, veterinary technicians, and animal handlers; change the way communities view street animals; and directly and indirectly enhance capacity of local organizations while also improving the well-being of animals. We carry out similar work with animal rescue centers abroad, helping to alter perceptions of wildlife and their needs.

HSI is also promoting non-lethal approaches to human-wildlife conflict around the world including the application of immuno-contraception technology to manage the fertility of wild elephant populations.

Disaster response and recovery work focusing on animals and their needs are another HSI priority. HSI enters every disaster scenario with an explicit priority of addressing urgent challenges, establishing plans for near-term stabilization, and implementing long-term strategies to restore and enhance local and regional response capacity and infrastructure.

Some things we'd like you to know about Humane Society International

HSI and its partner organizations together constitute one of the world's largest animal protection organizations — with over 11 million constituents worldwide.

HSI is an effective force for animals. With the support of advocates and donors, and our depth of technical and scientific expertise, we have helped to build greater awareness, to improve animal care, and to help enact strong legislation to protect wildlife, companion animals, farm animals, and lab animals around the globe.

HSI supports local animal advocates and organizations in countries all over the world to provide direct, hands-on care to animals in need and to spread the culture of compassion. HSI strikes at the root of problems affecting animals by providing the tools and resources to prevent animal suffering both now and in the future.

HSI is one of only a few international animal NGOs working to assist and protect not just companion and wild animals but also animals in laboratories and on farms. Unlike wildlife conservation organizations, HSI works to advance individual animal welfare as well as protecting threatened populations. For example, while some conservation groups argue that the elephant ivory trade is acceptable because it is sustainable in southern Africa, we oppose the ivory trade because it is cruel and provides a legal cover for illegal poaching, just as we oppose the global traffic in parts of wild animals.

Companion Animals & Engagement



- **HSI 2010 Spay Day International:** 52 international organizations participated.
- **Animal Care Expo 2010:** 54 attendees; 32 countries; 11 interns.
- **Haiti:** HSI responds to Haiti earthquake disaster – develops 5-year plan in cooperation with the Haitian Department of Agriculture and the Christian Veterinary Mission to set up first permanent Animal Care and Welfare Center in Haiti; Best Friends Society partners with HSI and provides \$350,000; 60+ Haitian vets attend HSI Disaster Training conference in July 2010.
- **Philippines:** Cebu City municipality, following an HSI training program, replaces killing street dogs in gas chambers and capturing them with wire capture nooses with humane euthanasia, spay/neuter and net capture.
- **Bhutan:** First year: spay/neuter/vaccinated more than 14,000 street dogs.
- **China:** Municipal teams from 27 Chinese cities attend HSI conference to end dog culls.
- **Trinidad & Tobago:** Sterilized more than 125 animals in Tobago and provided training experience for 30 Trinidad veterinary students.
- **Ecuador:** Trained veterinarians assisting three animal welfare groups that work with their local municipalities to reduce the overpopulation of street animals.
- **Caribbean:** Expanded Caribbean outreach programs in partnership with the Pegasus Foundation; strengthened the capacity of groups in an additional six island nations.
- **Peru:** supported the efforts of Vida Digna in bringing basic care to horses servicing the tourism industry in Machu Pichu. Over 1,200 equines have received treatment in this region alone.
- **Latin America:** Launched train-the-trainer program to improve local veterinary skills, increasing spay/neuter numbers and decreasing the number of unwanted animals and euthanasia rates.
- **Egypt:** HSI held veterinary training program in Egypt for 10 veterinarians located throughout the Middle East.
- **Tanzania:** Trained 48 school teachers on humane education targeting the welfare of working equines.
- **Street dogs:** initiated/currently running spay/neuter, humane education and veterinary and animal handling training programs in 21 different countries.

Wildlife



- Achieved CITES protection from trade for dozens of wild animal species.
- Provided funding for care of parrots in Cameroon.
- Worked with Interpol to support investigation of illegal wildlife trade and developed anti-poacher program.
- Brought world-wide attention to captive marine mammal welfare following the death of a SeaWorld orca trainer.
- Achieved greater protection for sea turtles from harmful fishing practices.
- Prevented weakening of whale protection at the annual IWC meeting.
- Helped to end importation of polar bear trophies into the U.S.
- Filed a petition to list the African lion as an endangered species under the ESA.
- Increased global protection of sharks from cruel finning, and decreased fin consumption.
- Provided training for wildlife enforcement officers in Morocco.
- Helped to achieve a ban on zoo animal performances in China.
- Maintained scientific credibility through coauthoring of papers in scientific publications.
- Successfully worked to include wildlife protection in the Trans Pacific Partnership (TPP) free trade agreement negotiations.
- Expressed support for the Dolphin Safe label during the Tuna-Dolphin Dispute at the World Trade Organization.
- Created an animal handling curriculum and CD for border and customs officials in Central America.
- Partnered with Interpol to train 80 Colombian police officers on the illegal wildlife trade and proper animal handling.
- Led cacao fairs for over 500 community members in Costa Rica and Nicaragua to celebrate the biodiversity on cacao farms and pledge to its continued protection.
- Formed the Model Wildlife Rescue Center Network for Central America and conducted its first meeting.
- Trained 70 community members in Costa Rica and Nicaragua as part of ecotourism program, on topics such as birdwatching, biology, and small business management.

End Animal Testing



- Successfully campaigned for non-animal replacement test for shellfish toxins that will spare hundreds of thousands of mice each year.
- Helped build a 100,000+ strong “cyber-rally” and secure vital new animal welfare measures in Europe’s new animal experiments law.
- Successfully promoted dozens of legislative amendments to reduce animal testing under European biocides (non-food pesticides) legislation.
- Launched the ‘Cruelty-Free 2013’ campaign to preserve the promised European ban on the sale of animal-tested cosmetics with celebrity support from Leona Lewis, Ricky Gervais, Judi Dench and others.
- Helped organize a major workshop and report on advanced, non-animal approaches to safety testing, building support among European companies and government officials for a fundamental “paradigm shift” in the way testing is carried out.
- Staff published technical articles in the peer reviewed journals Toxicological Sciences, Drug Discovery Today, Alternatives to Laboratory Animals (ATLA), and Alternatives to Animal Experimentation (ALTEX).
- Helped spur Organization of Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD) adoption of new non-animal guideline to replace skin irritation testing on rabbits.

Farm Animals



- **Reframed the US egg recall as a food safety issue arising from extreme confinement:** Our white papers and scientific reviews on salmonella in cage vs. cage-free eggs provided the basis for public discussions on the food safety risks of cage eggs.
- **Convinced five Indian restaurants and four Brazilian restaurants to adopt cage-free egg policies.**
- **Launched a Farm Animal Protection campaign in Mexico.**
- **Successfully lobbied the International Finance Corporation to subject IFC-financed farm animal operations to basic environmental standards;** secured inclusion of “Animal Husbandry” in IFC’s Performance Standards (PS6, section 26).
- **Increased the visibility of farm animal welfare issues within India and Brazil:** via coverage in *Times of India*, *Deccan Herald*, and the *Hindu*, as well as all major national and international industry journals. In Brazil, issues received coverage in twelve environmental magazines.
- His Holiness the Dalai Lama, following a visit by HSI representatives, issued a public letter condemning caged egg facilities and stopped intensive chicken rearing practices around Dharamsala in India.
- **Supported domestic and international farm animal protection campaigns with expanded online libraries of fact-sheets and white papers, as well as peer-reviewed publications; new additions to the HSUS online library (farmanimalwelfare.org) include:** *Understanding Mortality Rates of Laying Hens in Cage-Free Egg Production Systems*, *Welfare issues with furnished cages for egg-laying hens*, *Welfare of Sows Used for Breeding in the Pig Industry*, *Welfare of Piglets in the Pig Industry*, *About Turkeys*, and *Welfare of Calves in the Beef Industry*.
- **Staff members produced five new peer-reviewed publications.** Past publications continue to be extensively cited by academics worldwide.
- **Broadened the movement against factory farming globally,** via strong coalitions with human rights groups, environmental organizations, health professionals, climate change groups and other animal protection groups within Mexico, Brazil, India and UN bodies.

Disaster Services



- **The HSI assessment and response team arrived in Haiti a week after the January 12, 2010 earthquake to assess damage and needs** (see report in Companion Animals & Engagement).
- **HSI supported a response team from the RIMA Foundation**, one of its Chilean partner groups, to assess animal needs in the wake of the February 2010 earthquake in Chile, and deployed HSI's local veterinary consultant to assist directly on the scene of the disaster.
- **After the earthquake in China in April 2010**, HSI supported Chinese animal advocates working to rescue and provide veterinary care to animals traumatized by the disaster.
- **HSI responded with aid for stranded animals after Hurricane Karl** flooded Mexico in September 2010.

International Partnership Activities (a selection)

HSI is represented at the annual meeting of the World Animal Forum (a meeting of the CEOs of international animal protection organizations).

Dr Andrew Rowan is on the Board of the World Society for the Protection of Animals.

HSI is an international member of Eurogroup for Animal Welfare.

HSI is a founding member and is represented on the Executive Committee of the Species Survival Network.

HSI is represented on the coordinating committee of ECOPA, the European association of alternatives to animals' centers and programs.

HSI is a member of InterAction, the association for international development and disaster response organizations in the USA.

HSI is a founder and a Board member of the Fur-Free Alliance.

HSI is a member of ICAM (International Companion Animal Management Coalition).

HSI supported the Asia for Animals conference, the Middle East Network for Animal Welfare conference, a conference for Caribbean animal organizations and the Africa Network for Animal Welfare.

HSI provides advice on animal welfare matters to the U.S. Trade Representative's Office as a member of the Trade and Environment Policy Advisory Committee (TEPAC).
